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more sustainable species further from shore. Instead, the ratio of unintended sharks and rays caught to pelagic fish species is about 3.8:1. Facts and photos have been sent to the ministry of fisheries and tourism along with the signatures of 18 business owners, 85 tourists and letters from three international research stations. Great White Caught at Coconut Bay

The IDPPE fishing nets have been sighted bringing a great white shark onto Coconut Bay beach earlier in May. The great white is currently protected in South Africa, yet its range extends here into Mozambique, where there are no laws protecting the sharks. Whale shark sightings in Tofo have been down 75% this year from last year during january to May. So where have the big fish gone? Janneman Conradie, marine conservationist and microlight pilot from Vilankulos, few between Nyati and Mahangate and sighted 14 whale sharks in the last weekend of May. Two weeks prior, on his way to Tofo, he saw no whale sharks, the next day plenty! Barra Lodge reported two whale shark sightings in their bay during the monthe of May as well.
