# **Overview | Cotton**



About 870, 000 smallholder farmers

-About 4.7m people dependent on cotton

- Cotton- significant cash crop for households
  Poverty reduction impact
- Most governments set the cotton producer prices
- Most cotton grown outside RSA is rain-fed
  -SA commercially grown cotton has high yields (2MT/ha)
- Cotton ginning- ginners are the ultimate buyers

-Contract farming system; extend credit

New technologies, e.g. GMO seed

-Only South Africa presently allows the use of GMO cotton seed

Rising investment in cotton production

-Turks, Chinese, Mauritians, Indians in the region

Yarn production

-Large proportion of the yarn used in the region is imported

#### Knitting and weaving process

-Volume and variety made regionally is limited

Few textile firms

-Producing for internal use

Dyeing and finishing

-The missing link





## **Overview** | Apparel Sector



- South Africa is SADC's largest market
- Retailers, brands expanding regional sourcing
- Government incentives to improve the industry
- Market diversification- RSA market and the US
- Weakening South African Rand
- Cheap, illegal imports suffocated the industry
- Governments supporting investment by building factory shells

- Sub Saharan Africa (SSA) becoming a major consumer market

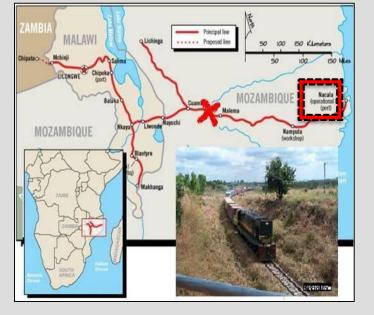
## Example | Nacala Corridor



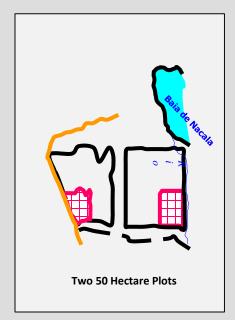
The Nacala Development Corridor \_\_\_\_\_

#### Bilateral Preferential access to RSA Market

- 3-6% duty, as apposed to 45% duty on garments

#### SADC Trade Preferential access to RSA Market

- Zero duty as apposed to 45% duty on garments
- For SADC-made products (duty free vs. 45% tariff)

#### ■ AGOA Trade Preference- US Market

- Duty-free, quota-free access to the US
- Seamless renewal expected by the Obama Administration
- Gradual economic recovery is good news for garment exporters

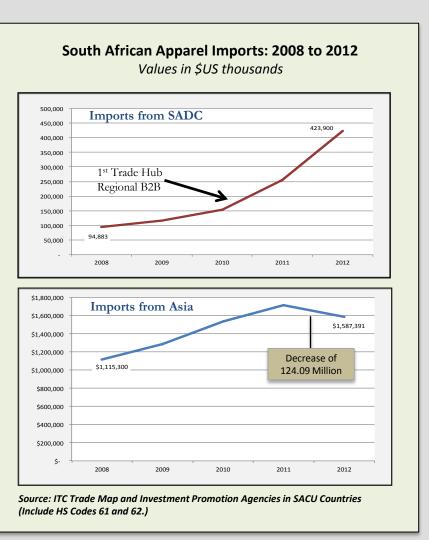


#### Tide is Shifting

 SADC countries are starting to replace some Asian exports to South Africa

More SA retailers looking to source regionally

 A shift of US \$125 Million in exports represents around 10,000 factory jobs

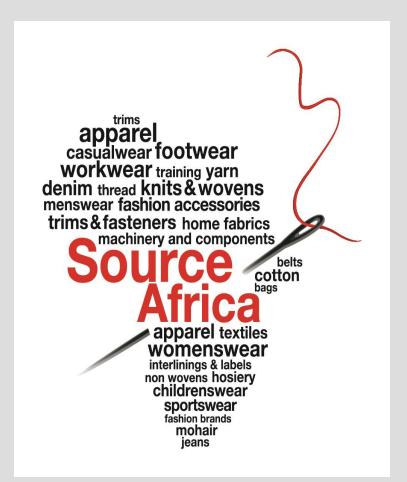
## Source Africa | Sector Trade Event
