## A Message from our Treasurer: Making a Move within Africa

A few weeks ago while in Mozambique, I witnessed the move of our Directors and Founders Dorien en Raj. With all their belongings and carvings, they moved from the project in Manga-Beira to the new project for agricultural education in Dondo, about 25 kilometers away. Unlike the Beira project, which is located off a major road, the Dondo project is located six kilometers inland from the village of Dondo. The only way to get there is via a very dusty, dirt road full of potholes. Coincidence or not: a week before the move, part of this dirt road was widened. Whether that had to do with the Governor of Sofala province's official visit on Agri-Tech will always remain a mystery. What does a move in Africa look like? Just as in the Netherlands, months prior to the move, one has to clean and sort everything. Luckily here all the excess things easily find a second or third home.



Thanks to a benevolent sponsor, Dorien and Raj received a completely new one-story house. The construction went smoothly, though definitely in an African manner, meaning that almost everything is a bit topsy-turvy. Despite clear drawings, which had been extensively discussed with electricians, carpenters, plumbers, painters, etc. beforehand, the workmen moved ahead under their own discretion...Here is one example: above the sink, on the left-hand side, there are six electricity sockets, yet not one socket on the right-hand side. Also, almost all the machines and ventilators are connected as one group, which means that nothing really works well and the sockets continuously blow a fuse. And since we are on the topic of electricity: Constructing electricity lines for Agri-Tech in Dondo was not an easy undertaking because the project is located in an area where electricity or running water does not even exist. The electricity source is several kilometers away. Not only is the electricity connection expensive, but also the telephone and fuel costs for trips to the energy company are high. Ultimately a day before the move, the electricity was successfully connected. Remember, coincidence or not: the Governor did, after all, come to visit!



Fortunately, Young Africa has its own truck. With the help of some workers, the household belongings were loaded in Beira and then unloaded in Dondo. The truck's cab doesn't have a cover, so you can imagine how 'clean' the stuff arrived in Dondo: completely covered in sand. However, after a few days of unpacking, cleaning and arranging, everything is now in its place. It should also be made clear that quality is not yet obvious in Africa. Young Africa, therefore, really tries to make its students aware of this fact.




It is going well with the training center in Beira. In the past 6 months there were 1,200 students, have received their diplomas on June 28.




## Construction

Thanks to contract with the European Commission, Wild Geese and YA International that started on the 1st of January, the construction of the workshops at Agri-Tech could start. The 1200m² of workshop space in 2 buildings will house milk processing, fruit processing, vegetable packing, milling & grinding of grains and a mini-factory for animal feed. Besides, still in June we will start construction of stables for cows and chicken. The development of the farm has commenced as well. The first vegetable seeds will be planted this week.

# Visits Governor Sofala & Irish Ambassador

Among many visitors of (N)GO's, we received on the 18th of May, the Governor of Sofala Province and his team. The Governor said he was impressed by the ambitious plans for agricultural skills training of the Mozambican youth and stressed its importance in the fight against poverty and unemployment. On 1+2 April the Irish Ambassador and his wife had elaborate tours of YA Beira and YA Dondo. Ex officio he is also director of Irish Aid that has financed the hostel and other programmes of YA Mozambique.







#### YA Zimbabwe Director visits Serve Ireland

The director had the opportunity to visit Ireland on the invitation of Serve Ireland. She visited Dublin AIDS Alliance, Christian AID and an out of school program in Dublin. Her main reason for the visit was to give a talk about Young Africa regarding vocational training. Vocational training was never an MDG goal and now in the development world people are discussing post 2015 MDG goals and it is our desire that it must be included because youth are the future of any nation and they require vocational skills.



#### **Epworth Expansion**



Construction is progressing well and the building is 95% complete. The contractor has just finished roofing and is now working on the ceiling, window and door frames. We are expecting the project to be completed by end of June. We have started sourcing equipment for the three workshops. Marketing for catering department began in anticipation to start training basic catering (6months) by July or August 2013.



#### YA Zimbabwe in Goromonzi

YA Zimbabwe has introduced mobile vocational training to rural youths in Goromonzi. After having received a boost in our equipment from donors over the past 2 years, the organization decided to reach out to youths in rural areas that do not have access to vocational training facilities using the same equipment. In May 2013 YA Zimbabwe started training in carpentry, welding, catering, hairdressing and cutting and designing. Currently 110 youths are benefiting from the program.








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YA Namibië





On 17 July, Yvette and Dirk Bellens, together with their two daughters, will be swapping their lives in the Netherlands for a new life in Namibia. As founders and directors of Young Africa Namibia, they will set up a new, energy-neutral Young Africa Skills Centre in Kuisebmund, Walvis Bay, offering various market-oriented skills training programmes to the underprivileged youth and operating as a knowledge centre in solar technology. In September they will start the first training course in solar technology, training students in the installation and maintenance of solar panels, in combination with basic electronics. As at all other YA centres, the students will get compulsory courses in Life Skills, HIV/AIDS and entrepreneurship, as well as assistance in finding attachments and/or (self-) employment. With this project "A sunny future for underprivileged youth in Namibia" Dirk and Yvette won the Dutch ASN Global Award 2011 and the Dutch campaign 'Cycling Scores' in 2012.



#### Wild Geese supports start-up YA Namibia
